From the Archives

Two projects are underway in the archives at the Thurnher House. Julie Fedde has begun work on a box of photographs contributed by the Crowell Public Library. These include a wealth of old scenes of San Marino. She will be recording information on source and date, inserting photos into mylar sleeves and filing each one by subject. We are pleased to announce that the second project, mentioned in the last Grapevine, has been funded by a grant from the Rotary Club of San Marino. The funds from this grant will allow us to purchase archival supplies to preserve the photographs, letters, books and ephemera from the Rotary collection. Two long time Rotarians, Ken Veronda and John Harris will help identify the people in photographs.

Each week we field telephone calls, e-mails and personal visits from people doing miscellaneous research or seeking genealogical information. A woman who grew up in San Marino but moved away as a teenager was able to find photos of herself as a middle school student at Huntington School, find the addresses of the homes of her parents and grandparents. Our collection of city directories were of help to her. We have directories in paper format as well as on microfilm.



E. J. MARSHALL - "THE LAST OF THE GREAT CATTLE BARONS"

For more than 60 years, scores of San Marino girls and their families have traveled the short distance from their homes to Mayfield Senior School in Pasadena. There the girls have attended classes in the magnificent mansion built by Edwin Jessop Marshall overlooking the Arroyo. Few knew much about him but they all learned to appreciate the beauty of the home Marshall had built for his family.

One thing they may not have known was that Marshall was a personal friend of Henry E. Huntington. Marshall's grandson Ned enjoyed recounting stories of accompanying his grandfather to Huntington's new home and of sitting on Mr. Huntington's lap out on the terrace, while the two friends visited. Another connection with San Marino was part of the SM Historical Society's recent field trip to the San Gabriel Cemetery. After stopping at the grave sites of Pattons, Lacys, Kecks and other wellknown local names, the group came to the Marshall family grave. And so the question was - who was E. J. Marshall?

Marshall was born in 1860 and died in 1937. Between these dates, he amassed a fortune in real estate. At one time, he was known as the single largest landowner in the US. He owned over 180,000 acres of real estate in the US and another 3.5 million acres in northern Mexico.

His initial fortune was made in the wild days of the first great Texas oil boom. However, due to family health concerns, in 1904 he sold his oil holdings and moved to southern California. Here he began to buy land - lots of land. Some of his properties have their own stories, such as the 42,000 acre Jesus Maria Ranch north of Santa Barbara. That property included 16 miles of prime ocean front and is now the home of Vandenberg AF Base. As owner of the Grand Canyon Cattle Co, Marshall controlled the north rim of the Grand Canyon.

His acreage in northern Mexico was in the states of Sinaloa and Chihuahua. In fact, the northern boundary of his Palomas Ranch actually formed the southern border between the state of New Mexico and Mexico, the country. Although at his time American property was at risk from Pancho Villa's raids, the Marshall properties were never touched.

In 1937, E.J. Marshall died. At that point, the banks began to foreclose on his highly leveraged properties. Edwin Jessop Marshall was recognized by the NY Times as the "last of the great cattle barons", while the LA Times called him "one of the most colorful figures remaining in the West".

In Memoriam: Midge Sherwood



We at the San Marino Historical Society mourn the death of Midge Sherwood, the founder of the Historical Society who passed away recently at 98 years. In the mid 1970s, as the bicentennial of the United States approached, Sherwood spearheaded the celebration in San Marino. At the same time she was the moving force behind the establishment of an organization to preserve the history of the city.

A graduate of University of Missouri School of Journalism, Sherwood had a long career in journalism. After moving to San Marino, she dedicated herself to researching and writing about the early families of San Marino. Among the books she published are <u>San Marino: From</u> <u>Ranch to City</u>, <u>Days of Vintage</u>, <u>Years of Vision</u> (three volumes) and <u>Fremont: Eagle of the West</u>.

We are are grateful to Sherwood for her contributions to the preservation the history of our community. The board of the San Marino Historical Society has made a contribution in her honor to the Huntington Library where she did so much of her research. Michael White Adobe Update

The Friends of the Michael White Adobe (FoMWA) are planning for the adobe's rehabilitation and future use. Adobe experts Anthony Crosby and Roy Tolles assessed the building's architectural and structural condition and provided recommendations for its rehabilitation. This information will be used in a Historic Structures Report (HSR) that will guide the FoMWA in our goal of housing a Hall of Fame for the 4-A's—Athletics, Arts, Academics and Alumni of the San Marino school district in the adobe. We identified this potential use in a 2010 feasibility study that like the HSR was funded with grants from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Los Angeles County Preservation Fund and generous donations.

Studies concluded the Michael White Adobe is in fairly good condition considering it is over 160 years old, but repairs and upgrades are needed to ensure its continued existence. Some lower courses of adobe blocks have suffered moisture damage and are deteriorating. FoMWA have identified and removed the source of moisture that caused the deterioration and is seeking to repair approximately 40 linear feet of damaged blocks as a first phase of rehabilitation. The repair work will replace deteriorated blocks with new adobe blocks up to three feet high in limited areas.

The first phase work will take 8 to 12 weeks. Given the school schedule, the project will likely occur during the summer break, which will coincide with the dry season. FoMWA has received some funding from the SM Historic Society, SM Rotary Club, Pankow, and community members for the first phase. We are continuing to raise funds for the repair project, as well as for subsequent phases of the rehabilitation.
