

## A Sketch of the History of San Marino on YouTube

A video presentation on the early history of San Marino was recently added to YouTube. It covers the period from time of the native populations up to 1928 and was prepared from a collection of over 80 slides from the archives of the San Marino Historical Society by Selina Du. She completed the project during her senior year at San Marino High School. Selina selected the slides with the help of Jason Carter, Assistant Archivist, and recruited a fellow student, Noah Wilson to do the narration. Using excerpts from a script written in the 1960s by a group of members of Friends of the San Marino Public Library under the direction of Dorothy Ross, the two students tailored the script it to fit the slides they selected. They were aided by Eric Sang who recorded the narration and selected the music. Rosie Burkhardt at San Marino High School Library provided the location for the recording.

For many years, volunteers took the complete slide presentation and script into the elementary schools when classes studied local history. Retired Carver School teacher Susie Anthony, who consulted on the project, remembers escorting her students to the auditorium where they gathered with other classes to listen to the illustrated talk on the history of the city.

San Marino Historical Society Archivist Judith Carter commented recently, "We hope this video will be of help to third grade teachers at Valentine and Carver Schools when they teach a unit on local history. It will also be of interest to all residents as well as a wider audience who is interested in the history of San Marino."

The slides have now taken on a new life using a more up to date technology. The seventeen minute program is available to the public and can be accessed in the classroom as well by going to youtube.com and typing in A Sketch of the History of San Marino. Perhaps this is a case of history repeating itself!

# Sidewalk Inscriptions Mark History's Steps by Mitchell Gould

(This article originally appeared in the Grapevine in January 1989 but it is still timely.)

When you are out walking, make note of the inscriptions in your neighborhood.

There is a custom among many contractors engaged in constructing concrete sidewalks to leave their mark pressed into the freshly poured material. Some of them imprint their names, some, the location of their headquarters, and many of them the date of construction. Their purpose is to allow pedestrians to judge the quality of the work they perform. Unintentionally, these autographs serve as a historical link with the past and stimulate a mental connection between the growth of San Marino and concurrent events in the world beyond our city's boundaries. For instance, one can read repeated impressions on the sidewalks along Sierra Madre Boulevard. On the west side of the Boulevard, it reads: J.B. Haddock 1927 Contractor.



The sidewalks on the east side were't built until 1929. These stretches of sidewalk have stood the test of quality for about sixty years of use (editors note: now closer to 90 years) and are for the most part ready to serve for another sixty years.

The contractors who dated the marks they left have done amateur historians a great favor. 1927 and 1929 evoke images and call up memories of events of those times unconfined by the boundaries of a young San Marino.


In 1927, a youthful Charles Lindbergh in a singleengined, fixed landing-gear monoplane - the Spirit of Saint Louis - flew across the Atlantic Ocean to Paris, France. Reading that date placed there so song ago evokes a scene of a lonely plane in the vastness of sea and sky.

1929 brings back a flood of memories of a time when the world's economy was leaping from peak to peak of feverish speculation followed by market crash, bank failures and the Depression.

Somehow, the sidewalk inscriptions make this events of the past live again in our imaginations. Sidewalk construction in San Marino and world events are linked in concrete, literally.

Many dates can be found. On Monterey Road, concrete work was done in the vicinity of Banning Way by a

contractor named Williams in 1925. It would be interesting to know what the oldest date in the city might be. Unfortunately, in many areas, sidewalks and curbs were removed to permit the construction of depressed curbs and ramps for wheelchair access, and in the process contractor inscriptions were destroyed. That is the sort of thing archeologists run into frequently.



Nevertheless, there remains in existence a considerable record in concrete awaiting a systematic compilation and analysis as part of the history of where we live. The names of A.O. Nelson, Nelson and Lutzow, Robert P. Law, Bartlett & Mathews, Larson & McCarthy, Osborn, Myers and many others are engraved and give mute witness to some of the activity that helped make our city what it is today.

# Remembering Oskar Rudolf Thurnher (1928-2018)

We mourn the passing of Oskar Thurnher who's family lived in the Thurnher House while his father Armin was Park Superintendent during the creation of Lacy Park. Oskar was a generous supporter of the San Marino Historical Society over the years. He was a graduate of South Pasadena/San Marino High School and served in the US Air Force in Korea. He relocated to Northern California for college and graduate school. He worked for General Electric Nuclear Power Generation Group for almost three decades. In 1980, he purchased half interest in an ambulance company and retired in 1989. In the years since, he devoted his time to the American Red Cross, the Crippled Children's Society and a number of community beautification projects.

Oskar, his brother Bert and their children visited the Thurnher House for a family celebration luncheon earlier this year. The brothers shared stories about growing up with Lacy Park as their back yard. Oskar donated his family history to the San Marino Historical Society Archives to preserve the history of the time that Lacy Park went from a lake to a park and his family's contribution to the city.



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# The "Nixon" Chair and Richard Nixon's Rumored Visit to San Marino

One day last year Mitch Lehman of the San Marino Tribune asked if he could bring by a chair to donate to the San Marino Historical Society. He said the chair came from the offices of the old San Marino Tribune building on Huntington Drive. The owner of the Tribune before the Salters, Cliff Smith and Frank and Dorothy Rice, was Herb McCormick. The story is that Richard Nixon stopped by the Tribune to speak to McCormick and sat in the chair. We have no way of proving it but it is possible.

Julie Fedde, a long time volunteer in the archives, did a little research about the chair. She found that it was made by the Marble & Shattuck Chair Company, Bedford Ohio. The designation on the bottom of the chair is M15, No. 11, 2003 WAL. An internet search revealed that the captains chair was made between 1885-1894.

Another Nixon story with a connection to San Marino is that a group of men invited Richard Nixon to meet with them at a house on Palmas Drive just after he left the U.S. Navy. The men gathered to convince Nixon to run for office. They must have been successful. Among the archives is a campaign poster. Please contact the Historical Society to help verify this meeting.
